Alphington Community Centre (ACC) is a neighbourhood house located in the heart of Alphington. ACC is managed by paid staff and is governed by a volunteer committee. Our ongoing funding comes from the State Government's Neighbourhood House Coordination Program, and from both the City of Darebin and City of Yarra.

ACC began in 1982 as the Alphington Self-Help Exchange (ASHE) to provide activities and support services primarily for women at home with young children.

Today we provide services for the whole community.

Like all neighbourhood houses, ACC relies on numerous volunteers and quite a variety of long and short term partnerships to deliver our diverse range of programs each year.

ACC is proud to be one of over 400 neighbourhood houses in Victoria.

Our fete this year was a big success and the dog show just seems to get bigger and better, even sporting its own calendar this year.

We have also started some other regular events such as the suitcase rummage sale to coordinate with the farmers market now operating nearby and we hope to build on partnerships with the market in coming years.

In recent weeks we have been working on our strategic plan and hope to engage with the community on our operational plan. That is what we want to see and do in the centre over the next few years. Through this we can explore even more exciting opportunities.

Moving into 2019 I am standing down from the committee. I have truly loved being involved in the ACC but its time for me to focus on some other things.

I leave the centre with great confidence that it is moving forward in a positive direction with a great sense of love and community led by Leanne, her staff and our committee.

### COORDINATOR'S REPORT

It has been another busy year at ACC.

We have progressed lots of physical changes as we have sought to make the most of our building and grounds.

By moving our office into the old foyer and toy library area, and by constructing the community shed, we now have the opportunity to program in four spaces simultaneously, rather than two.

This has made a huge difference to what we can offer from our facility.

As well as internal changes, we have made some significant changes to our exterior this year. Our aim has been to make ACC look like the creative and friendly community space it is!

With donated tiles and lots of volunteers, we have created a new mosaic sign. And we have utilised the talents of Jen our new community development worker to weld some gorgeous signs for our shed and for our community garden.

Just for fun we also created a mini-golf hole in our front garden and it is lovely to see the school kids have a putt on their way home each day!

We've also added in some 'trees' made from iron and recycled plastic lids (another Jen project) and reorganised our fencing to better connect our indoor and outdoor spaces.

This year has been a great year for playgroups! Community demand has increased and we now offer **Japanese Kilin Playgroup** twice a week, and with our new spaces we have been able to support a number of new **Baby Playgroups** as well.

Just before Christmas we officially opened our community shed, and Dave is running our **Men's Shed** program. Jen has been running **Art in the Shed** on a Thursday.

Friday mornings are a hive of creativity, sustainability and friendship here at ACC as people come for **Craft Club**, **Gardening Group** and the **Men's Shed** program. Craft Club was a new addition this year (building on the Alphington Angels Knitting Group) and has been well attended and very productive. And we'd like to thank all the people who have contributed wool and needles for those doing charity knitting.

We'd also like to thank everyone who has donated to and purchased from our **Mini Op Shop**. It is just lovely that people recycle their treasures with us ... and pop past to buy things.

Our **Book Clubs** have proven particularly popular this year, and we ended up adding a second Monday night group into the mix at the start of the year.

We also ran a number of interesting one-off workshops. We love it when people in the community volunteer to share their knowledge and skills, and in this regard we'd really like to thank Vanessa for running the **Learn to Cross Stitch** workshop in August and Anne for running the **Improve Your Gut Health** workshop in March.

Other one-off highlights were the **Best Veggie Patch** workshop in September, the **Art Journaling** workshop in October and then the **First Aid Certficate 2** in March, the **Spotlight Walk with Ranger Pete** in May and the **Make-Up for Girls** workshop in June.

Our **Autumn Fete and Alphington Dog Show** was once again fun and fabulous! We took so many great photos of all the extra cute dogs with their owners that we've turned them into a calendar for 2019.

At the end of the day neighbourhood houses are of course all about people, so I'd like to thank everyone that is part of our lovely community.

I'd particularly like to thank the Committee for all their input and support through this year of change and growth.

And I would like to say a big thank you to all the staff at ACC. We are always dreaming of the next big thing and pulling together as a team to deliver within our small budget. And everyone consistently comes to work with their hearts filled with kindness and goodwill.

#### **ART JOURNALING WITH ASPHYXIA**

Lots of families and people of different ages join in our weekend workshops. We loved having deaf artist Asphyxia (author of the Grimstones) here with her interpreter in October to teach us about art journaling. It was a fabulously creative and inspiring workshop that was well attended by a great cross-section of our community.







#### THE SHED LAUNCH

We combined our Christmas lunch with the launch of The Shed in early December.

We were delighted to provide Cr Daniel Nguyen, Yarra's new Mayor, with his first ribbon cutting opportunity! And it was terrific that Cr Susan Rennie from Darebin could also attend.

The joint cutting symbolised the unique role ACC plays in equally servicing both Yarra and Darebin residents.

It has been great to start up our new programs in The Shed including Men's Shed on Fridays and Art In The Shed on Thursdays.









#### MOSAICS WORKSHOPS

In May we began a community project to create a new mosaic sign for our centre.

We held two Saturday workshops followed by two weekday workshops ... and ended up with a fabulous new sign that now proudly hangs on our wall (thanks Darebin Council for putting it up for us).

We are delighted that the sign is owned by so many ... not just those that that mosaicked, but also all the people who gave us their tiles - like Anne whose pink bathroom tiles were invaluable, and also those that donated old crockery - like Justine! Thanks everyone.







#### **PLAYGROUPS**

This year we were thrilled to be able to provide a space for two new Japanese playgroups. We also continued to run our Czech and Slovak playgroup, our open community playgroup and our peer support playgroup. Uptake of playgroups has boomed this year.

We also provided the opportunity for four new baby playgroups to meet at our Centre. These groups evolved from mother's groups that began life via the formal programs offered by the maternal and child health services of both Yarra and Darebin Council.







#### STRATEGIC PLAN

This was the last year of our 2016-2018 Strategic Plan. Nearly all of the projects identified within the plan were started, and the vast majority were completed.

Those that are still on the go will be incorporated into out new Operational Plan for 2018+. These include:

- The removal of all asbestos from our building
- · Our front garden upgrade, and
- Our mural project.

#### **ACC STRATEGIC PLAN 2018-2020**

Our new Strategic Plan has as a different structure from those we have had in the past. It focuses on succinctly articulating our vision, our purpose and our goals as an organisation. It identifies *how* we will go about doing things.

Our new Operational Plan is the document that captures *what* we will do. This document is a working document that will be reviewed and updated annually.

In our first Operational Plan we have attempted to identify a realistic project plan for the coming year, and then to flag projects that we hope to action in two years time, and those that have a longer timeframe.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

#### **OVERVIEW FOR THE YEAR**

Following my first full year as Treasurer I am pleased that I can continue to report very healthy and well balanced financials for the year 2017/18. The financial position of the ACC has continued to grow and be well managed by Leanne and overseen by our Finance Officer Peter Drinan.

#### 2017/18 FINANCIAL RESULTS

This year, I'm also pleased to report that once again the centre sees a trading profit of \$6489. The profit was derived from a continued focus on maintaining strong grant and revenue streams whilst managing expenses in line with delivering many beneficial community programs.

Our underlying financial position has continued to improve due to further grants being received this year. This consolidation and continued fiscal management sets up the ACC for a further healthy financial position in 2018/19 and beyond. Please refer to detailed financial reports attached.
